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Chair's Forward

“Where you live should not dictate your education”, this has been our mantra for the past 6 years and will continue to be at the foundation of the Country Universities Centre Snowy Monaro (CUCSM).

It gives me great pleasure to present the Annual Report for Country Universities Centre Snowy Monaro for 2019.

The CUC model inhabits an educational space for regional, rural and remote NSW that previously did not exist. In filling this space it provides opportunity for regional growth for industry, business and our students, consequently strengthening communities.

CUCSM is proudly the inaugural centre, established as a community board in 2014 after inception in 2013. With vision and foresight, the then Local Council, Snowy Hydro Limited and businesses, identified the strong link between tertiary education, business growth and building our town. The idea that local students were confronted with the decision to relocate in Metropolitan areas or study at home with inadequate or no connectivity was inequitable, equally difficult was attracting people to our town to take up jobs while studying.

In true Australian spirit the backing of an idea for a regional study hub in Cooma was established, inspiring this exciting chapter in growth of Australian regional education. Through attracting State and Federal Government funds, this model is fast becoming a feature across our State and Australia.

CUCSM are extremely grateful to the founding and continued financial support received from Snowy Hydro Limited and the Snowy Monaro Regional Council as they continue to recognise and support the impact this model is having on our region.

This year thanks to Federal funding, we were able to update our IT systems, to continue to bring to our students state of the art technology in a facility and environment conducive to learning and succeeding in their studies. We are currently looking to employ a dedicated academic support educator also through this funding, which will enable our students to consistently continue to achieve high educational outcomes on par with students living in Metropolitan Australia. 97% of CUCSM students felt the centre helped to improve their academic results.

Through our CUC network, University partnerships are growing and we will be able to add to our suite of degrees through the 'Distance with Assistance' arm of the venture, such as the established Bachelor of Education (Early Childhood) and Bachelor of Education (Primary) that are studied through Central Queensland University. Through this partnership, we provide tutorials delivered at the local level through CQU's highly qualified, wonderful tutors who bring with them experience and teaching skills.

The Centre Manager has a huge role and is integral in supporting and providing a space for students to network and belong. This year our Centre Manager Jayde Egan moved up to a position in the Central team and we welcomed Nadine Holland as our new Centre Manager.

Our centre has been a hive of activity in 2019, often on show as an example of best practice for interested other councils looking at a functioning study hub within our CUC model, visiting school groups, hosting delivery of 5 x HETI courses using the VC equipment to reach a broader student number, 2 x professional development courses delivered by Sydney University in 'Fundamentals of Project Management', meeting an identified need within our town and an increase in school leavers utilising the centre.

Health, Education and Business continue to be the dominate areas of study for our region with 83% being female and 18% male students registrations. We are currently at 110 registered students. CUC Snowy Monaro looks forward to developing further fantastic pathways for supporting growth in tertiary education within our region and being part of the CUC family.

I would like to thank and recognise the support and commitment from our staff, board and our overarching CUC team. I am excited to see where developing this study hub model will take us for 2020.

CUC CEO Message

The CUC Snowy Monaro sits in a special place at the heart of the Country Universities Centre. In

2013, it was the first Centre developed under the CUC model and only the second community owned and operated higher education facility of its type established in Australia, following on the development of the Geraldton Universities Centre. Now there are sixteen such models operating nationally (six of which are affiliated within the CUC Group), and many of these hubs look towards the CUC Snowy Monaro and its track record for guidance as to best practice in operating a regional universities centre.

Snowy Hydro and the Snowy Monaro Regional Council should take great pride from their establishment of this Centre. The success of the Cooma facility and Geraldton was noticed by the NSW Government in 2017, and then the Federal Government in 2018, as funding streams were developed by these governments so that the community owned universities centre model could be expanded and replicated in other locations in NSW and Australia. Further, the CUC Snowy Monaro was noted as a Case Study in the recently released National Regional, Rural and Remote Tertiary

Education Strategy. The Expert Group writing the strategy reported:

To understand the success of the two most prominent hubs, the Advisory Group visited the Geraldton Universities Centre and the Cooma Country Universities Centre. The key lesson from the visits was that the effectiveness of Hubs is dependent on strong local leadership and ongoing local engagement and participation, which facilitate flexibility to cater to the local labour market and community need.

The Centre Manager, Nadine Holland, and the Board ably led by Chair Carolyn Ewart, are to be congratulated for providing the strong local leadership and ongoing local engagement underlying the success and effectiveness of the Snowy Monaro Centre, as noted in this excerpt of the National Report by the Expert Group.

The CUC Snowy Monaro has kept its appeal to the community, with record numbers of registered students in this, its seventh year of operation. It's services also broadened this year through a partnership with University of Sydney Centre of Continuing Education, under which two short Project Management Courses were delivered to the local community.

Quality of student support and experience is key to the CUC, and next year opportunities will deepen to provide additional academic mentoring to students through the generosity of a grant from the Vincent Fairfax Family Foundation. This exciting development will assist CUC Snowy Monaro to further raise student aspiration and build confidence as to the academic success that is possible in the model.

Despite now operating for seven years, the CUC in Snowy Monaro and elsewhere still feels like a new model, with plenty of flexibility to adapt and fine tune operations to optimise the services it provides to the local community. I will look forward to the Centre leadership's strategies in further evolving CUC Snowy Monaro to keep it fit for purpose, meeting the challenges and taking the opportunities that lie ahead in the next twelve months.

We wish her all the best in her new role with the Central Team. We welcomed our new Manager, Nadine Holland in June and I also wish to thank her for all her wonderful work in the centre to date. Nadine is fully invested and has made many connections through the community for our centre as she builds the student base and beyond.

It is imperative that I acknowledge at this point, our Central team and their board for all their guidance in steering the CUC into a brave new world of uncharted waters, under the magnificent wisdom of Duncan Taylor. Duncan is an inspiration in anyone's terms and is a great support to me personally, with his vision for equity in tertiary education for regional rural and remote Australia under the growing CUC model, I am convinced we will see great things unfold for 2020.

Strategic Plan

January saw us come together to modify our Strategic Plan for 2019.

Our purpose - CUCSM is to be a core provider of quality tertiary educational services in Snowy Monaro that is aspirational, trustworthy and accessible.

We decided on six objectives and accompanying actions to assist in achieving our goals. The Plan is always on the board table every meeting to continually remind ourselves and to keep us focused. We have accomplished or have under way many of the actions.

New board members

I have to mention that a lot of my time this year was taken up with interviewing and the recruiting of new board members, to no avail, until now.

New Manager for CUCSM

I wish to thank the interview panel, Frances Robinson, John Rooney and especially Shannon Payton McDonald for so ably meeting their commitment in selecting a Centre Manager. This was a very big process, particularly for Shannon and we were delighted to welcome Nadine Holland as our successful candidate.

NSW Government announcement

John Barilaro announced in February as an election commitment of \$7 million over a 3 year plan, to have a satellite CUC in Jindabyne attached to the education precinct, along with a TAFE connected learning centre. Community support is needed along the way to make it feasible and our board needs to examine the sustainability of the venture.

Central and CUCSM

- CUC obtained FRRR status which means all centres can now access DFR status. So,
- therefore centres receive philanthropy donations.
- \$22000 will shortly be received from Federal Government for each hub in Australia, to go
- towards Governance training, this will be utilised in 2020
- Appointment of our new General Manager, Douglas Martin
- Partnerships are getting closer in Nursing through CSU and Psychology and Social Work
- through UNE.
- There are plans for more short courses through University of Sydney over 2020.

Professional Development Short course

Sydney Uni delivered 2 x 'Project Management Fundamental' 2 x day courses. Highly successful with a fabulous facilitator. Skill sets and PD short course are very much a part of our future in meeting the needs of skill gaps in industry and business, also revenue building for CUCSM.

Geraldton Regional Study Hub Conference

It was an amazing experience to attend this conference. It puts a very different spin on what we are achieving in our state under the CUC model, to hear and see what others are doing in their communities as the realisation that this idea collectively may be the future of growth.

Ceil, Rhett and Jessica from Higher Education Program Management visited on site to assist with any questions and gaining valuable feedback for themselves, regarding our Government reporting obligations. It is so worthwhile when these types of meetings done in a FTF forum.

Regional Study Hub Symposium 2019 - Cooma/ Crackenback 14 - 15 November

This was without doubt the most successful event on every level. The generous financial support of the National Centre for Student Equity in Higher Education (NCSEHE), enabled the conversation established in Geraldton, to keep going and attracted the attention of Ministers resulting in the Hon Dan Tehan Minister for Education opening and addressing the conference. Every regional study hub in Australia was represented. It also provided the opportunity for our CUC to get together the day before for FTF meetings, workshops and strengthening relationships. Thank you to our Central Team, particularly Monica Davis and my wonderful board and Manager for sprucing up the Centre and presenting a sensational outfit to all the visitors from across Australia.

In conclusion, I would like to once again recognise the support and commitment from our staff, board and overarching CUC team for all the work done to improve regional, rural and remote education but always remember it is our students that are at the centre of our existence. I am excited to see where developing this study hub model will take us for 2020 and how we grow and build CUC Snowy Monaro for the sustainable future.

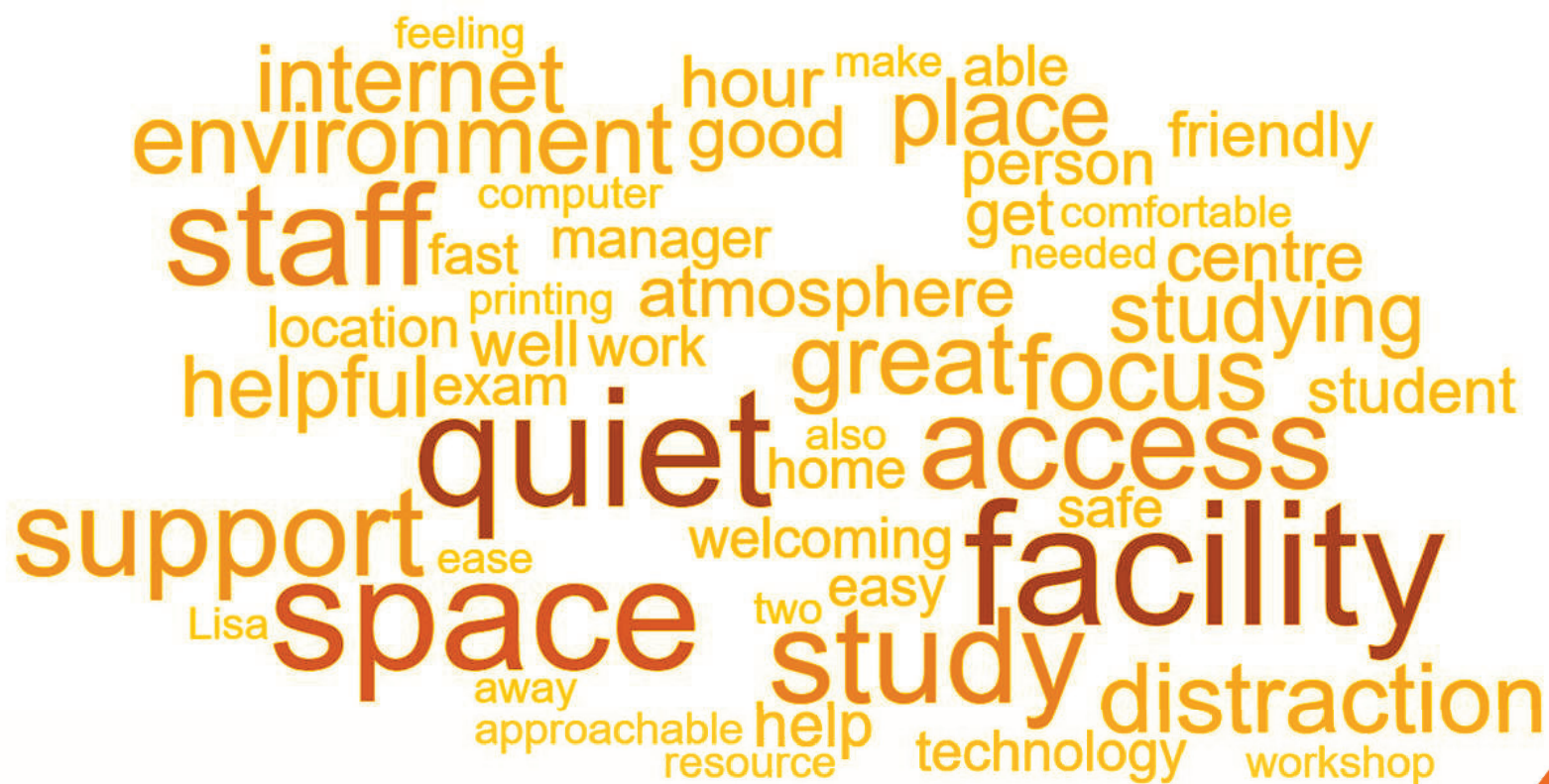

Cooma Universities Centre was opened on 6 March, 2013 as joint initiative between Snowy Hydro Limited and the then Cooma Monaro Shire Council. Initially there was no Government funding for the Centre.

In 2013, 51 students registered to use the Centre.

In 2014, the Centre became an incorporated, not for profit organisation and became governed by a board of community-based, volunteer directors.

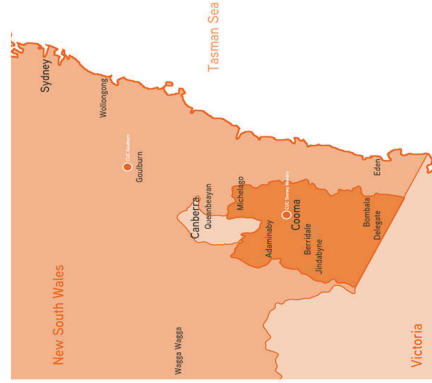

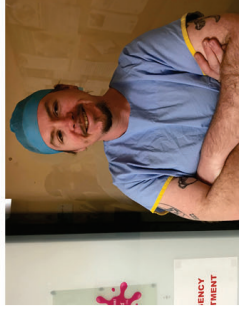

"Using CUC Snowy Monaro resulted in a high distinction! I can't believe it is completely free!"

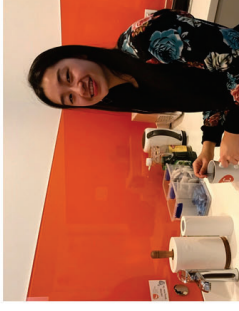


Blayne Thomas

"CUC Snowy Monaro gives visiting students a quiet place to study when living in temporary accommodation".



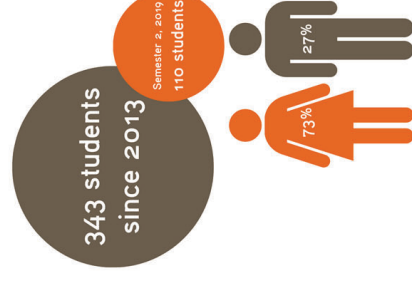
